1. Encourage your child to look for word families eg play, playing, played, plays and rhyming words – cat bat	8. Encourage self-checking of any written work
2. Use a dictionary to talk about alphabetical order and definitions	9. Cut out words from a newspaper, jumble up the letters and ask child to sort them out
3. Encourage your child to 'Have a go and look at it!' If it looks wrong tell them to have another go	10. Use a felt pen to blank out letters in old magazines, comics, mail shot adverts. Ask child to supply missing letters
4. Don't punish for mistakes!!!	11. Ask child to help younger children with spellings
5. Use endings of words to suggest sound families. For example w-ill can become st-ill, h-ill, p-ill, f-ill	12. Look for words within words — to+get+her = together. There's a RAT in separate
6. Help your child to use the eyes as a camera for taking photographs of difficult words. Look at a word – Shut eyes and picture the word – Open eyes – Try to reproduce the word picture – Try again	13. Play games of Boss and Secretary (pairs of children can play this also). One person dictates prepared sentences, the other writes them down. They check the spellings and then swap over the roles
7. Play word and spelling games — Hangman, Junior scrabble, Crosswords, Word searches, Word Bingo etc	14. Encourage your child to join up letters when spelling a word to help remember the letter order
